In February 1994, the first Rural Fringe was produced under Shaun Robson's editorship. The headline: Burning Pride. Hall bushfire brigade were fighting a fire at Yarralumla woolshed on 6 January 1994 when they received a message that the horror fires in and around Sydney had worsened and they were to get up there as soon as possible. Leaving enough crews behind to protect the ACT, the Sydney crew set off that evening and were sent to Lane Cove – West Pimble where the flames were leaping ninety feet in the air. One front leapt a six lane highway and median strip to set the other side of the road ablaze. ... continued on page 23



Wallaroo Fire Brigade News

The brigade has had a very busy start to

the fire season, to date and has responded to many incidents, including a major fire on Southwell Road where several properties came under direct threat. Crews also responded to fires in Gundaroo, Parkwood, Bookham, Dicks Creek and Hall and have continued to have crews stood up at the station on days of total fire ban. The brigade also has been deploying day and night crews to the Bookham fires. We have a very dedicated membership who has been giving freely of their time to meet these emergencies.

Many of the members conduct their own businesses and hold full time jobs, but still find the time to put back into the community. The Rural Fire Service is made up of volunteers from all walks of life - men and women from different cultural backgrounds, age groups and professions. Rural fire brigades are a reflection of every local community. Becoming a volunteer fire-fighter is easier than most people think. Brigades offer training ranging from bush fire-fighting, village fire-fighting

and first aid to breathing apparatus operation. We don't just offer a fire-fighting role; we have a multitude of areas that require volunteers. Communications, catering, logistics, planning and aviation support are critical — there is a job for nearly everyone in the RFS. Some of these functions can be maintaining the trucks and equipment and providing welfare to the active firefighters. We rely heavily on the support of people from all backgrounds in our community. The people that make up our Service are as different as the society that we protect. The minimum age to join the Rural Fire Service as a volunteer is 16.

Remember the famous quote by John F Kennedy, "ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for the country". We need the community to step up and assist... Join the RFS, become a member and get involved. At present

half of our active membership do not live in the Wallaroo area but reside in the ACT and travel to the Wallaroo station for training and fire calls. As I have indicated in the past the Wallaroo Brigade mail to 650 residences in the

brigade area, we have 3 trucks and we need to have enough members to meet our local demands and those of other emergencies. So get involved. As a member you do not need to be an active fire fighter, there are many other roles within the brigade and the



HISTORY REPEATS AT 'SUNNY CORNER'

The 2012-2013 Fire Season already looks to be an active one with plenty of grass fire activity keeping the

Hall Brigade busy and it isn't even February – normally our busiest month!

Hall Brigade has already responded to several grass fires and has been part of the ACT's striketeam to Bungendore that saw our two tankers provide vital asset protection and fire suppression but Hall also sent crews day and night to Yass as the ACT mobilised a five day taskforce to support our NSW colleagues.

Closer to home Hall Brigade continues to remain active

from our Shed in Loftus Street in the ACT's high fire danger days and this proved valuable on Saturday 12 January when a fire started in our own backyard after

a tree arced across a powerline on 'Sunny Corner' and started a grass fire. Hall Brigade would like to thank a passing Territory & Municipal Services Parks crew for spotting and reporting the blaze even before One Tree Fire Tower was able to make the radio call and Hall's 2 heavy tankers were able to swing in to action and assist. Thanks also to Wallaroo for offering assistance after hearing the Village might have been at threat. The fire was thankfully quickly contained

and as mopping up began there were a couple of Hall crew members, Andy Fulton and Mal McLeod and land lessee, John Starr, that truly understood just how important the quick response was.

History would show one of the worst fires to affect the Hall region, the Black Tuesday fire of February

13 1979 began at 'Sunny Corner' with a downed fuse from a powerline and was reported by the fire towers early afternoon. Bill Gouge was the first to respond, but with little water in his slip-on unit and fanned by winds gusting to 70 kilometres per hour, the fire burnt fiercely in a northward direction and quickly grew in size - spreading at an estimated 8 kilometres

per hour. Brian O'Connor and Brian Coulton were next on the scene on the back of Coulton's Ford 100 fitted with a tank and pump and remember the sheer ferocity of the fire, sustaining burns to their hands. Fighting on the other flank were members of the Bolton family in their Morris Commercial, the same model that is parked in Roger Ball's yard today.

At around 3.30pm the fire had grown in size and approached the Gundaroo Road, four kilometres from the source.

Just one hour later the fire had reached the Gungaderra Homestead (about 7 kilometres from the

source), the fire was running strongly in fully cured Phalaris grassland. Reports at the time described the fire behaviour as erratic with flame bursts of 4 to 10 metres and huge fire whirls.

The town of Sutton was evacuated at about 5pm, when the fire reached the tops of nearby hills and began moving towards the town on a one-kilometre wide fire front.

A major wind change to the south-west occurred about half an hour later and the fire broke

out along the entire northern flank and burnt strongly to the north east.

By the time the fire had been controlled, at about 4 am the following day, a total of 165 square kilometres continued on page 6

or 16,500 hectares of land had been burnt and the fire had claimed two cottages, three sheds, machinery and stored fodder, approximately 5000 sheep, six horses and fencing worth \$200,000.

As current NSW fires in the region approach 14,000 hectares, on average, the 1979 Sunny Corner fire probably seems quite insignificant, but as the fire that was the catalyst for Jim Rochford reforming our Hall Brigade and as we obviously celebrate Canberra's centenary it is important that we recognise history, good and bad, and remind ourselves that history can, and often does, repeat itself! On Saturday 12 January 2013 the temperature and fire conditions were identical to 13 February 1979!

Rotary Youth Leadership Award Program

The District 9710 Rotary Youth Leadership Award Program (RYLA) finished on the 18 January as an outstanding success. RYLA runs every year as a 6-day residential program for 18 – 25 year olds. It is held at Greenhills Conference Centre in the ACT. Participants

are identified as having leadership potential and sponsored by the District Rotary Clubs. While RYLA is a district project, it is currently run by the Rotary Club of Hall with five of the members giving up their time to facilitate it.

This year we had 28 participants with five mentors and five leaders. The mentors are young people who were indentified as having exceptional leadership qualities from previous RYLA programs. The leaders

have a range of training and administrative backgrounds to lead and manage the program. RYLA's focus is to develop the participants into capable, confident and ethical leaders. The program introduces the participants to concepts of effective leadership such as:

- Fundamentals of leadership
- Ethics of positive leadership
- Effective communication
- Problem solving and conflict
- · Building self confidence and self esteem.

The program has expert speakers from a range of professional areas, such as community volunteer, not-for-profit, public, private, military and political backgrounds. All the speakers, mentors and leaders volunteer their time at no cost. Some of the topics covered include fundamental concepts of leadership, identifying their own personal leadership styles, listening and learning styles, values, ethics and leadership, self care, communication, managing conflict



and expectations. We had speakers from the RSPCA, an overseas project Abundant Water, Canberra Refugee Support and Senator Kate Lundy. All spoke on how the participants can make a difference. There was a session on mental health first aid to provide

participants with tools to support friends and family when a person is in crisis. The week ended with an inspiring session from a double lung transplant survivor.

The participants all felt that they have benefited

enormously. Some of the comments made included:thank you for the most inspiring and motivating weeks of my life — I will never forget it. . . . so grateful for the opportunity, . . . my appreciation will be shown in my future actions and RYLA was my sbark.






The Events Calendar is on the website along with a veritable feast of other useful and relevant information. All residents of the district should have this site saved to their favourites.

Are Your Pets Disaster Ready?

The 10th anniversary of the fires that devastated many parts of the ACT in January, 2003, reminds us that we

should always be prepared for the unpredictable. Storms, fires and floods can come at any time and affect pets as well as people. Many pets were lost in the fires of 2003. Some were injured or died, others never found their owners and were re-homed or euthanased.

Make sure that your pets are microchipped and that your contact details on the appropriate register are up to date. If you have time attach a tag with your mobile number and address, and your vet's phone number to your pets' collars so that if someone without access to a microchip scanner picks them up you can be contacted.

Have an emergency kit packed in advance. Include non-perishable food like dry dog kibble, water in spill proof containers, collars, leads, harnesses, cat carrier, litter tray, blankets and treats as well as a first aid kit. The first aid kit should

have gauze swabs, bandages, disinfectant, cotton wool, scissors and the appropriate size muzzles for your dogs. Even the most placid animal may react unpredictably when in pain.

Decide where your pets will go if you have to evacuate. You may have family or friends outside the danger zone who would look after them. Kennels or shelters may be available in an emergency.

If you leave your pets at home leave them in the safest enclosed room in the house, usually the bathroom, with food and water. Don't ever tie animals up as they will injure themselves trying to escape. Leave a notice on the gate or door of the house with your contact details and saying that there are pets inside.



The Community bill board signs are made from checker plate aluminium that was supplied and installed by a local business and will stand for the age of this town many times over. The flower gardens will be a community project with the help of local businesses and our newly formed gardening club. The proposed score board is to be cladded with local timber from the recently demolished gold creek homestead, built, installed and maintained by

locals for the use of any sport on the oval. And in many years from now we will discuss the fact that these structures were hand made by locals and what important heritage value these structures represent; fulfilling the heritage requirements.

I ask the community and more so certain individuals to look at what heritage means for Hall with an open mind not just by following the Hall Heritage Precinct written by a governing body that is not always correct in their decision making.

I also ask the community to use local business more and not to treat this place as another suburb of Canberra but a village with an extended community and together we can improve Hall and the district without detracting from its heritage value, charm and character.

Everyone is entitled to their opinion and some would see no changes to our Village and district as the correct path to follow. The other opinion is to make Hall a better place to live and work incorporating the modern convenience without defacing it's history. Unfortunately those who complain the most have a difficult time lending a hand.



Standard Plants

I recently visited a garden that used many standardised plants to add a more formal structure to their design. These trained plants have the benefit of taking up less space than some of their bigger relatives, with their single trunk and clipped canopy you can add height into a garden without taking up too much space at ground level, and are a brilliant solution to a narrow space.

Standardized plants are a marvellous alternative to regular sized shrubs that potentially can outgrow their space. A row of standard plants forms a green wall, dividing spaces in the garden or a single plant may be used to provide a focal point or as contrast to less formal plantings. Many standard plants are also great for pots in courtyards or small spaces such as balconies or either side of your front door.

The best plants to use are bushy types with fairly compact foliage - some examples suitable for our gardens include

Japanese box (Buxus microphylla var. japonica), cumquats, bay tree (Laurus nobilis), rosemary (Rosmarinus officinalis) and Arbutus unendo. Some flowering plants are also suitable, providing a lovely spectacle when in bloom: Camellia varieties, Gardenia florida, Rhaphiolepis indica, and Fuchsia cultivars. Many trees are trained

as standards, such as the ornamental weeping cherry, maples and the mop-top Robinia 'Umbraculifera' and these are usually grafted.

One of the major benefits of standardising a plant is the amount of control you can have over a plant that may ordinarily be rather unruly or untidy. For example: a Laurus nobilis (Bay tree) can be messy and huge in

its natural form, but when standardised they remain neat and ordered.

These plants can be expensive to purchase, so if you have patience and a little determination it is possible to train them yourself. Ideally you should buy a plant with a straight stem, provide support with a strong stake. All the lateral branches below the proposed canopy should be removed. Some lower leaves may be kept initially to help develop strength in the stem as it grows. When the central stem has reached the desired height, pinch out the growing tip. This will

allow the shoots below to mature and help form the canopy. Keep all the stems short in the first growing season, then prune to shape regularly. Any shoots from this time on that form on the stem should be removed.

Of droughts and flooding rains...

What a super-hot January we've been having! An average maximum of 33°C (taken from two enthusiasts' online data for January 1-27, in Ngunnawal and Wallaroo), four degrees higher than the usual January average (BOM climate data). Only 6mm of rain and 180mm of evaporation in the first three weeks. Several days of extreme fire danger, and moisture rapidly deserting. If only it would *rain*.

And then, to answer our prayers of "send her down, Hughie", on Australia Day the skies opened. Rainfall

measurements for the rain event varied from 38mm at a Wallaroo weather station to 86 and 93mm at two Hall Village rain gauges! Peak rain rates were measured at 180mm per hour! Hall Village looks like it has been scoured clean.

Just goes to show how localised our rainfall can be, though... Hope you got enough wherever you are. But spare a thought for Gladstone, Qld, who recently had 750mm in three days!

The tutorials are free, but bookings are essential as they are limited to six participants.





Stage 4 Water Restrictions Commence Monday 4 February 2013

Due to the continued dry weather throughout summer, and the ongoing construction of the Yass Dam, current Stage 3 water restrictions in Yass, Bowning and Binalong will be **increased to Stage 4** commencing from 8.00 a.m. Monday 4 February 2013. Current Stage 1 restrictions in Murrumbateman (bore supply) will remain in place.

Stage 4 restrictions require the following conditions to be observed:

BOGART

The use of sprinklers (these include pop-ups and micro-sprays) or hand held hoses for **half an hour only** in accordance with the following schedule:

Odd street numbered houses between 7.00 p.m. and 9.00 p.m. on odd numbered days. Even street numbered houses, between 7.00 p.m. and 9.00 p.m. on even numbered days. Houses with elderly people only, between 7.00 a.m. and 10.00 a.m. on alternate days.

Vehicle washing is not permitted. Private swimming pools must not be emptied, refilled or topped up without prior written approval. Pool Covers are encouraged.

Buckets can be used at anytime for **essential garden watering only** that does not cause pooling or run-off. No hosing of hard surfaces unless required as the result of an accident, fire, health hazard or other emergency.

Unable to fight the exploding trees and fireballs, their job was to protect homes, and "not one house protected by any of the Hall crews burnt down, although some went close." It is an amazing story of humble camaraderie among our very own bush fire brigade. And now in February 2013 the same headline is warranted, in appreciation of the tireless work of our bush fire brigades (and our community fire unit) in looking after Hall and district, and other areas, and to support their call for more volunteers. It is with burning pride in our volunteers that we bring you this issue of the Rural Fringe. Thank you!

In his letter, Shaun O'Connor makes a number of insightful points about how culture and heritage evolve, which of course they do. It is good to have an arbiter though and we collectively worked long and hard to win a buffer around the village to prevent Hall getting swallowed in the suburbs, and for our heritage listing, of which I am proud. What I think is unfortunate is when the arbiter (the government) is powerless to enforce the rules on major breaches, such as we've seen for Victoria Square. Nonetheless, and in spite of being one of several residents involved in court to try to help uphold those rules I am thankful a practical decision has been taken as I understand it to inhabit those dwellings.



I am thrilled to see some action from our Progress Association committee on the school site, where I hope we are able, as a community, to agree on some realistic and positive ideas. Replacing all the asbestosridden demountables has to be a priority, so we can secure long term buildings, of an appropriate style, for agreed community use. I, by the way, will be urging for solar panels on all the buildings. Open and nonjudgmental consultation about community decisions is the way to build consensus around new ideas. The consultation process around the Rugby Club scoreboard was commendably transparent. I look forward to the forum when initial plans to upgrade Hall's main street will be shared so I can contribute my ideas and views.
