Hall Men's Shed 2023 – 2024 Foreman's Annual Report

Our BBQ on 6th July started the year for us. We had 39 attendees and I note that on 7th July 2022 we had 28 attendees. I guess it shows we are growing a bit. We also helped in other community events in Hall, such as helping to clean up the Hall Reserve and holding the sausage sizzle at the Brass on the Grass event in October.

There were a few talks by various people during the year. Rod Roberts gave an interesting talk on Digital Power of Attorney. A talk by Michael Collins from Men's Table. Even I did a brief talk on my life to date.

Our Christmas Party was held on 7th December at the Hall Pavilion and we had Eat Your Words Catering providing the meal again. The event was great as was the meal.

Our first meeting after the Christmas break was on 11th January 2024 and 22 members attended. Work was started on refurbishing and extending the deck to the annex.
